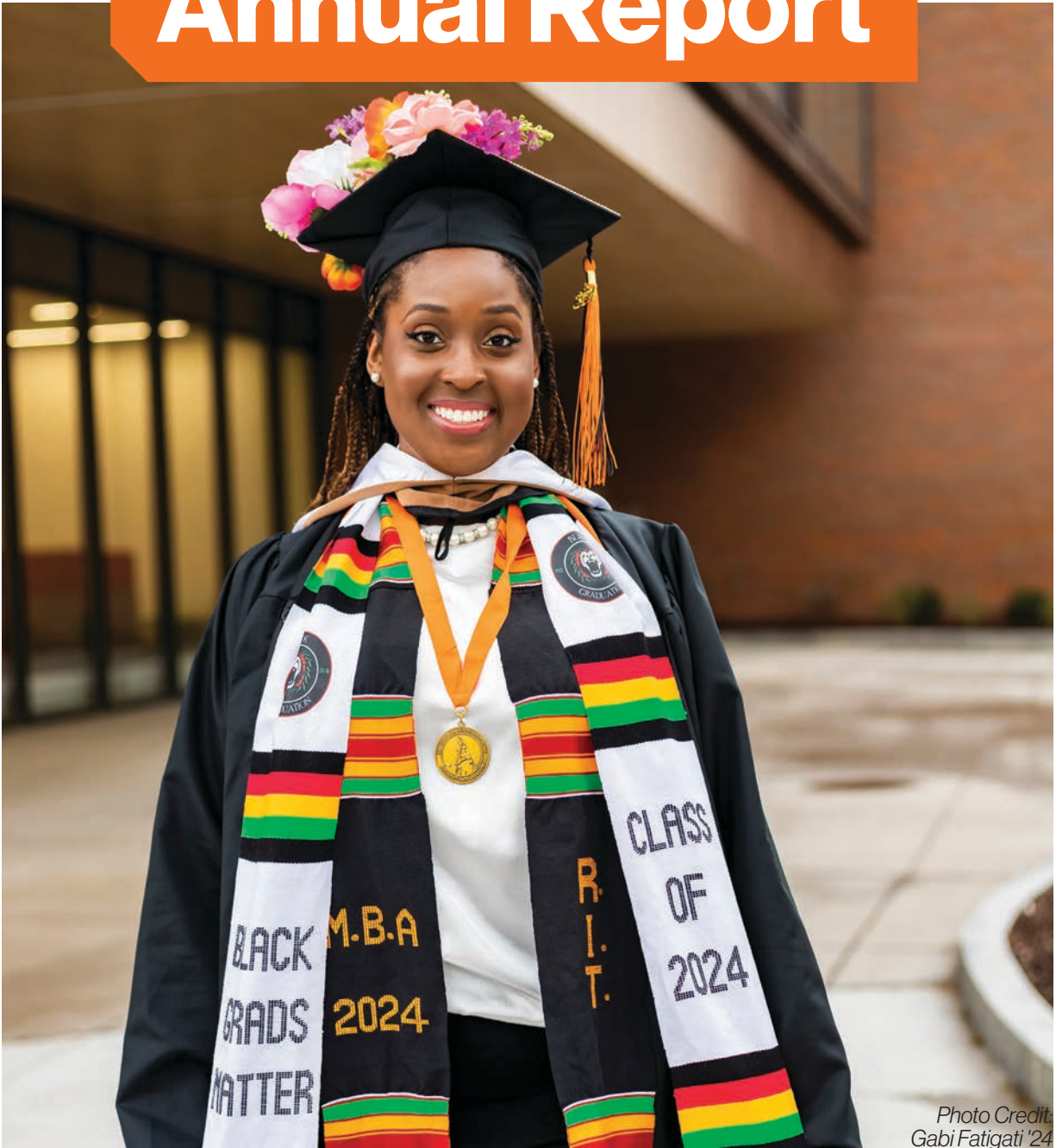

The 2023-2024 academic year was a success at Rochester Institute of Technology. There have been some amazing changes to our campus and we invite you to tour our new facilities during your next visit!

- **Student Hall for Exploration and Development (SHED)**, a collaborative maker space, opened in the spring. We hosted our Performance Teams Open House there the night before the spring University-Wide Career Fair, connecting employers with students who bring engineering principles to hands-on application.
- **Saunders College of Business** also unveiled its renovated building in the spring. This fall, we'll host the Saunders Career Fair Preview, a free event for employers interested in connecting with our business students, the evening before the University-Wide Career Fair.

This summer, we engaged with our students on co-op through various touch points. From RIT Co-op Night at the Rochester Red Wings baseball game to check-ins in cities like Boston and New York, we've created opportunities for students to connect and thrive. Our Co-op Wellness Check-in Survey also helped us identify and support students who may be facing challenges in their co-op experiences.

We continue to work with our incredible employer partners to identify co-op opportunities for our students. A special thank you to our employer partners for their continuous support in recruiting and hiring our RIT Tigers.

As you read this annual report, you'll discover the impressive accomplishments of our co-op and graduating students. We look forward to continuing to help them achieve their career goals and connecting them with our dedicated employer partners.

Behind the Numbers

RIT is a leader in providing experiential opportunities for students. RIT graduates benefit from these experiences with one of the highest rates of positive outcomes among private universities in the United States. RIT's Office of Career Services and Cooperative Education team establishes strong relationships with undergraduate and graduate students throughout their college careers. This report features data collected from summer 2023 through spring 2024.

Office

Data was collected from RIT Career Connect, powered by Symplicity. This career platform tracks various office analytics, including number of student appointments, event check-ins, and more.

Career Fairs

Six career fairs were organized and executed by Career Services during the 2023-2024 academic year. Career Services obtained accurate student, employer, and alumni attendance through RIT Career Connect.

Cooperative Education

At RIT, cooperative education (co-op) is required in the majority of undergraduate programs and encouraged in most graduate programs. Students who complete a co-op must report their job to Career Services and submit a co-op work report at the end of their experience. As a result, Career Services receives salary data, learning outcomes, and feedback about how the experiences impacted their future career goals.

Graduate Outcomes

Through the First Destination Survey, Career Services learns about recent graduates' plans after graduation, including the employers they'll join and graduate schools they'll attend.

To collect post-graduation data, Career Services hosts events across campus, participates in graduation ceremonies, and collaborates with academic departments.

Career Services coordinators continue to support recent graduates in their job search process. Consistent with National Association of Colleges and Employers (NACE) standards, recent graduates are encouraged to fill out the survey up to six months after graduation.

Office of Career Services and Cooperative Education

Career Services supports RIT bachelor's and master's degree students, as well as alumni, throughout their career development and job search for securing co-op and full-time opportunities. Career Services also provides tremendous support to employer partners for their recruitment needs through career fairs, information sessions, and more.

Did you know?

- During the 2023-2024 academic year, **4,308 students** completed **5,736 work assignments** gaining practical employment experience with **1,836 employers** in the U.S. and abroad.
- During the 2023-2024 academic year, students earned **\$67.8 million** through co-op employment.
- Each RIT bachelor's and master's degree student has a Career Services coordinator assigned to them offering support and guidance.

Co-op

Cooperative education, or **co-op**, is a hallmark of an RIT education. RIT students apply content and skills they learn in the classroom to meaningful work experiences related to their fields of study.

Co-op employment is significant, full-time, paid employment that prepares students to be skilled professionals while developing real-world competencies. It's the key to completing a well-rounded education.

There's More Than One Way to Co-op

International Experience

Career Services' International Experience Program helps RIT students develop cultural competence, improve language skills, expand global networks, while gaining essential skills in their field of study.



This year, RIT marked the 20th anniversary of its inaugural International Experience Program, A Door to Italy, in Genoa, Italy, with a special event featuring dignitaries such as the mayor of Genoa, a representative from the U.S. Consulate in Milan, and local industry leaders. The milestone highlighted RIT's commitment to providing students with valuable international experiences and fostering cross-cultural exchange.

Internship with Course Credit

This provides RIT students with practical, hands-on work experience, typically completed over the summer or coordinated around students' academic schedules. Differing from a traditional co-op, an internship with course credit is not always full-time work or a paid position.

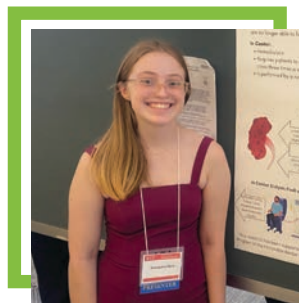

Co-op Wellness Check-in Survey

Each fall, spring, and summer term, Career Services emails a Co-op Wellness Check-in Survey to students on co-op, internship, research, or international experience to help identify challenges students may be facing. The Career Services team provides timely support and guidance, ensuring students can navigate both the exciting and sometimes stressful aspects of their work experience with confidence.

This signature fair includes employers that range from small firms to Fortune 500 companies. Thousands of students from every college at RIT attend each semester to meet with employers recruiting for co-op and full-time opportunities.

Career Services also offers Interview Day the day after the University-Wide Career Fair, which allows employers to schedule in-person interviews with connections made during the career fair.

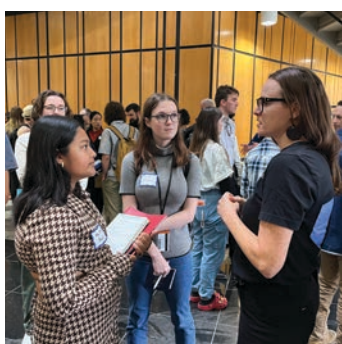

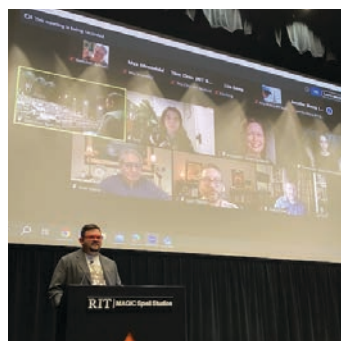

Coordinators provide ongoing support to students by organizing workshops and information sessions, developing and teaching career preparation courses, and providing individual advisement. They offer job search strategies, resume and cover letter reviews, interview and career fair preparation, job offer and salary negotiation advisement, and more.

Employer Information Sessions

Employers and students have the opportunity to network and discuss co-op and full-time opportunities. Career Services helps coordinate the employer's virtual or in-person information session to ensure the most significant exposure to our Tigers.

Mock Interview Days

Career Services hosts virtual Mock Interview Days prior to each University-Wide Career Fair in order to help students master the art of interviewing through one-one-one guidance from our employer partners.

Speakers and Panels

Industry experts participate in workshops and panels each semester to help RIT students in their job search and career preparation.

Workshops

Career Services strategically coordinates workshops that help prepare students to stand out among their competition. Students leave more confident in resume and cover letter writing, interview and career fair readiness, salary negotiation, and more.

Celebrating Career Journeys through Cooperative Education Dinner Reception

RIT students who completed co-ops gathered with RIT President David Munson, deans, faculty, Career Services staff, and first- and second-year students. Upperclassmen shared highlights of their co-op, internship, research, and international experiences. Career Services recognizes the unique advantages international students offer employers, including diverse global perspectives, strong language skills, and high adaptability. **Assistant Director for International Student Career Services Julian Huenerfauth** supports RIT international students in their co-op and full-time job searches.

The assistant director organizes **workshops** each semester to assist students in their job searches, such as the Find Success in the USA series and Graduate Careers Bootcamp, which cover resume tips, networking, U.S. cultural differences, visa information, and other resources.

International Drop-in sessions, introduced last year, have continued with increased student participation. These sessions allow students to meet one-on-one with the assistant director for quick job search and U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services questions. Additionally, students can learn about and get help with applications for the International Experience program.

Assistant Director for Career Counseling Christopher O'Connor helps RIT students and alumni explore their **occupational interests and develop plans for academic and professional success.** This process is centered on the development of self-knowledge in which students learn how their interests, abilities, skills, personality traits, and values connect with the world of work.

Individual **career counseling appointments** allow students to express their hopes and fears about the future, explore career options through assessment, clarify professional goals, and receive guidance on where to find accurate resources on careers of interest.

In addition to one-on-one appointments, the career counselor offers **workshops and classroom presentations** on a variety of career development topics, including coping with anxiety in the job search, planning for graduate school, understanding transferable skills, thinking of changing your major, and considering alternative pathways. The career counselor also facilitates programs that support students with disabilities, including RIT's participation in the government's Workforce Recruitment Program.
